viruses

Ebola, cold, flu, measles, chicken pox, polio, yellow fever, rabies, smallpox



antiviral

bacteria

anthrax, tuberculosis, gonorrhoea, strep, plague, cholera, typhoid, tetanus

FINE PRINT: No single drug can effectively treat all of the infectious agents within any one category. And even a drug normally effective against an agent is not always effective.; for example, antivirals effective for some flu strains, but only when used soon after symptoms appear. Many of the infectious agents mentioned above have also evolved resistance to the drugs that previously worked. It is always advisable to avoid infection in the first place.
